Programme

Sonata V in E minor for Flute and Continuo, BVW 1034. J. S. Bach

Adagio ma non tanto ١.

11. Allegro

Samantha McSweeney – Flute Kirsten Robertson - Piano

This is one of the six surviving sonatas for flute written by Bach, three of which were for harpsichord and three for basso continuo. This original score for this sonata only contains a basso continuo line for the accompanist, however we are using an edited score which contains a fully transcribed part. This piece is believed to have been composed during Bach's earliest years as Kapellmeister in Cöthen, around 1717-20.

Bassoon Concerto in B Flat Major KV 191 W.A. Mozart (1756 - 1791) 11. Andante ma Adagio Breanna Abbott – Bassoon Catherine Norton - Piano

The Mozart Bassoon Concerto was completed in 1774 when he was just 18 years old. Since then it has become the most popular piece for auditions and soloist performances in the bassoon's repertoire. The second movement highlights the lyrical quality of the bassoon through its emotional and dramatic melodies.

Flute Trio, Opus 59

١. Allegro non tanto

Bella Anderson Samantha McSweeney **Ainslee Smithers**

Kaspar Kummer was a German flautist and composer. He composed mainly chamber music and most of his compositions featured the flute. This is the sixth of nine total trios for flute, first published in 1830, and is dedicated to F. Kuhlau, another prolific composer for flute who lived during the same period.

Hot Sonate for alto saxophone and piano (1930)

Movements III and IV

Peter Liley – Saxophone Catherine Norton - Piano

Erwin Schulhoff was a Czech composer and pianist born in 1894. His late music was heavily influenced by jazz, and Hot Sonate, premiered in 1930, is as cool, raucous and smoky as classical music gets. Sadly, Schulhoff did not survive the second world war, and has fallen into undeserved obscurity since.

Pastorale, Op. 147

Samantha McSweeney – Flute Billie Kiel – Clarinet Bre Abbot - Bassoon

Darius Milhaud was a French composer, conductor and teacher. He was a member of the group 'Les Six', a group of 6 prolific French composers in the early 20th century. This piece was composed in 1935, it is written for Oboe, Clarinet and Bassoon, but due to the lack of music for our instrument combination the oboe part is being played on the flute.

Movements I, II, III

Isabella Gregory - Flute Finn Bodkin - Marimba

I. On the magical island of Bali, flowing gamelan melodies intertwine with the sound of the "suling" (Balinese bamboo flute) to form rich colourful tapestries. The marimba and flute start out as one, their sounds indistinguishable. Bit by bit the flute asserts its independence, straying further and further from the marimba melody. An argument ensues - but all is resolved at the climax.

II. The haunting sounds of the Japanese "shakuhachi" flute float out over the warm echoes of the rolling landscape.

III. Complex rhythms and South Indian scales set the two instruments off in a race to see who can outplay the other. The marimba is set in a three bar cycle of 5/4 + 5/8 + 5/6 but the flute plays a different cross rhythm each time, returning to the marimba's pattern at the end of every cycle.

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
