#### **GRAHAM HOWELL**



## FAITH IN ACTION

At the Special Assembly in April, Presbyterian Woman Aotearoa New Zealand successfully brought a recommendation that the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand (PCANZ) actively supports and promotes the World Council of Churches' <u>Thursdays in Black campaign</u>, committing to a world free of violence and rape. After receiving a message from the Moderator of PCANZ, Right Rev Hamish Galloway, Parish Council agreed to support this campaign and invites and encourages you as members of the congregation, to wear black on Thursdays.

The World Council of Churches website has this to say about the campaign: *"We all have a responsibility to speak out against violence, to ensure that women and men, boys and girls, are safe from rape and violence in homes, schools, work, streets – in all places in our societies. The campaign is simple but profound.* <u>Wear black on Thursdays</u> *to declare you are part of the global movement resisting attitudes and practices that permit rape and violence. Show your respect for women who are resilient in the face* 



of injustice and violence. Encourage others to join you. Often black has been used with negative racial connotations. In this campaign Black is used as a colour of resistance and resilience."
