



CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE PARTNERS:



Omar worries about having enough water for her family and animals. The Israeli authorities only allow her community to take limited water from their wells on the West Bank, in the Occupied Palestine Territories. Like other Palestinian communities they have to purchase water because these authorities will not let them dig new wells, install rainwater tanks, repair leaky pipes or extend water infrastructure to other homes.

The Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees has had some success in negotiating water improvements with funds donated from overseas partners including CWS. In Gaza the water poverty is much worse. In this climate crisis, we stand with people in need of water justice. **Together we join with others to make peace.**

5. Hope-for-peace child, God's stupendous sign, down-to-earth child, star of stars that shine:

How about a Spring or Summer break away from Wellington? As a fundraiser for St Andrew's on the Terrace to help boost finances affected by Covid-19 cancellations for the St Andrew's Centre, we have 3 holiday homes on offer for a short holiday. The owners of these 3 holiday homes have generously agreed to donate all rent received to St Andrews. Bid for a date at:

1) A classic cottage in Greytown at \$90 per night;

2) A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night;

3) A holiday home at Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

The Cottage in Greytown sleeps up to 4 people (2 bedrooms: one queen, two singles). A separate sleep out has 2 single beds for a larger group.

The house in Whanganui and the house near Picton both sleep up to 6 people. You need to provide your own towels and sheets.

For the houses in Greytown and Whanganui, you are responsible to leave the property as you found it.

For the holiday home at Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee. Send me an email to see if the property you would like to rent is available. Weekends tend to be at a premium so book early.

If your requested dates are available, you will be sent confirmation and detailed information about the holiday home and how to reach it, how to get in, instructions about water and power, and you will be sent bank account details for you to pay for your stay.

WIDER CHURCH AND COMMUNITY NOTICES

AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL NEWS

The 10th December each year is designated as World Human Rights Day. It is the same day that Amnesty International promote their Write for Rights campaign – encouraging people to write letters on behalf of people detained or persecuted for standing up for a just cause.

This year Amnesty will focus on 10 cases. These include:

- human rights lawyer Chow Hang-Tung detained for commemorating Tiananmen Square crackdown;
- Environmental activist Shahnewaz facing imprisonment for raising concerns about the possible environmental damage of a new coal-fired power plant;
- Iran's Vahid Afkari, who comes from an activist family who challenge inequality and political repression;
- Congolese mum and hairdresser Dorgelesse sentenced to 5 years in prison while undertaking her first protest.

For every single one of our 10 cases you'll be able to easily take action online, including solidarity actions. And there's also a link to help amplify our campaigns via your social media feeds.
