

LIGHTING THE RAINBOW CANDLE

CANDLEMAS CEREMONY

Introduction.

Candlemas commemorates the ritual purification of Mary, 40 days after the birth of Jesus. It also marks the ritual presentation of the baby Jesus to God in the Temple at Jerusalem. The Gospel of Luke says that Jesus was met by Anna and Simeon. Simeon held Jesus and called him a Light to the World. The festival is called Candlemas because this was the day that all the church's candles for the year were blessed.

Candles light up many sacred moments in our community throughout the year and at gatherings large and small.

Purple during Advent – a penitential colour – a longing for life to be different.

White during Christmas – the colour that speaks of Love.

Green during Epiphany – the colour of new growth and possibilities

Purple (again) during Lent – the colour for grief, sadness and regret as we follow Jesus to Calvary

White and Gold – for Easter and the triumph of LOVE

Red for Pentecost and the Sundays following – representing the fire of the Spirit warming and encouraging the fledgling Church.

Blue for the Season of Creation – the colour of the Earth when seen from Outer Space.

Green during the time between Creation and Advent. Sometimes referred to as "Ordinary Time" – green is the colour of vegetation and growth.

Our Rainbow Candle celebrates our children and our diversity.

As a fundraiser for St Andrew's on the Terrace to help boost finances affected by Covid-19 cancellations for the St Andrew's Centre, we have 3 holiday homes on offer for a short holiday. The owners of these 3 holiday homes have generously agreed to donate all rent received to St Andrew's.

- 1. A classic cottage in Greytown at \$90 per night;
- 2. A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night;
- 3. A holiday home at Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

The Cottage in Greytown sleeps up to 4 people (2 bedrooms: one queen, two singles). A separate sleep-out has 2 single beds for a larger group.

The house in Whanganui and the house near Picton both sleep up to 6 people. You need to provide your own towels and sheets.

For the houses in Greytown and Whanganui, you are responsible to leave the property as you found it. For the holiday home at Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

"Thank you for the opportunity to make a submission on the Budget Policy Statement (BPS). We are very supportive of the BPS's intent and the five wellbeing objectives for the 2023 Budget, but we remain deeply concerned at New Zealand's comparatively high level of military spending

As we have seen over the past three years, the COVID-19 pandemic has devastated lives and livelihoods around the world, highlighted and exacerbated systemic social, economic and political inequities, and exposed the flaws in government spending and other priorities, including the folly of maintaining armed forces in a constant state of combat readiness when there are so many other more pressing needs.

That applies just as much here as it does elsewhere, and it is our view that new thinking about how best to meet our real security needs is essential to achieve a genuine Wellbeing Budget that enhances human security, resilience, and prosperity for all New Zealanders.

Our submission therefore: briefly outlines some of our concerns around the costs of military spending in relation to social, economic, environmental and climate

justice; New Zealand's obligations under the Convention on the Rights of the Child with regard to Budgets and the best interests of children; proposes a better way forward to achieve the Budget wellbeing objectives; and concludes with three recommendations:

- that all funding allocated for military purchases and upgrades over the next decade be put on hold pending a comprehensive review of New Zealand's wider security needs and how they might best be met [as outlined below];
- that the allocation for military spending across Vote Defence, Vote Defence Force and Vote Education is decreased in the 2023 and future Budgets; and
- that a thorough Child Rights Impact Assessment is conducted on any military spending included in the 2023 and future Budgets."

UN Committee on the Rights of the Child considers New Zealand's performance this week

The UN Committee on the Rights of the Child - which monitors state party compliance with the Convention on the Rights of the Child (the Convention), the Optional Protocol on the Involvement of Children in Armed Conflict (OPAC, also known as the Optional Protocol on Child Soldiers), the Optional Protocol on the Sale of Children, Child Prostitution and Child Pornography (OPSC), and the Optional Protocol on a Communications Procedure (OPIC) - will consider New Zealand's performance this week. The Committee will hold two interactive dialogues with government representatives in Geneva, starting at 3am on Friday morning (NZDT), during its 92nd session which runs from 16 January to 3 February 2023.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY TASTER EVENING

St James in Lower Hutt. Tuesday 7 Feb, 7-8.30pm

Education for Ministry is an adult learning programme designed to link Christian faith with daily life, and to deepen Christian commitment.

It combines scholarly and systematic Bible study and education in theology and church history, with small group worship, prayer and fellowship. What we learn through our study is joined to our own lives and experiences through the exciting, challenging, and faith-building process of theological reflection.

It is for lay people of all ages.

An EfM group consists of 6-10 participants and a trained mentor who meet weekly for 2-3 hours over the course of a year.

EfM encourages honest exploration of issues within a safe and trusting environment. It recognises that people come with a range of views and ideas about God and fosters a culture of mutual respect for diversity.

Participants begin the four-year course, committing to one year at a time. They commit to do their reading and personal reflection (about 3-5 hours per week), and agree to attend meetings as a faithful member of the group (2-3 hours per session).

A full year of study costs \$300. In addition, participants are responsible for buying their own textbooks.

There are no formal assignments or exams and EfM. The emphasis is on personal study and growth.

There are two groups currently running in Wellington (St Peters Anglican Church, Willis Street) and Hutt Valley (St James' Anglican Church Lower Hutt).
