

How about a late Summer break away from Wellington?

For the last couple of months 3 holiday homes have been available to St Andrew's people for rent as a fundraiser to help overcome the deficit in St Andrew's finances caused by Covid.

The owners of the three holiday homes listed below have generously donated all rent received to St Andrew's.

Following our February Finance and Facilities meeting we should be able to report how much has been raised through this initiative to date.

Please note that the cottage in Greytown is available for only some of the time during February. Please contact Lynne direct if you are interested on 029 279 8120 or doveygray@gmail.com

The three options are:

- 1. A classic cottage in Greytown at \$90 per night;
- 2. A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night;
- 3. A holiday home at Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

The Cottage in Greytown sleeps up to 4 people (2 bedrooms: one queen, two singles). A separate sleep-out has 2 single beds for a larger group.

The house in Whanganui and the house near Picton both sleep up to 6 people. You need to provide your own towels and sheets.

For the houses in Greytown and Whanganui, you are responsible to leave the property as you found it. For the holiday home at Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

Send me an email to see if the property you would like to rent is available. Weekends tend to be at a premium so book early.

If your requested dates are available, you will be sent confirmation and detailed information about the holiday home and how to reach it, how to get in, instructions about water and power, and you will be sent bank account details for you to pay for your stay.

Somervell Presbyterian Church art project WAIATA MANU

15 February – 2 April 2023, Tues-Sat, 10am-4pm

Te Papakura exhibition space, Beehive, Wellington

Entry via Parliament's Visitor Centre, ground floor of the Beehive.

Waiata Manu ('Bird song') engages the audience in the beauty and wonder of birds in sound and light through the lens and instruments of artists, digital artists, sculptors, photographers and musicians. Birds are explored through art as metaphor and allegory and the interpretations and artistic creations they inspire in us. It recognises birds as a pre-eminent symbol in New Zealand artwork and identifies both well-known and more recent artists. It explores the unique place of specific birds and bird conservation, threatened and extinct species including our role as conservators.

Resources:

Book recommendation and reflection from Richard Keller:

It's been noted that the worst flooded areas in Auckland during the 'rain bomb' last month were areas where streams and wetlands had been 'reclaimed' ('confiscated' might be a more accurate word in many cases) for urban purposes years ago. The land seems to be resorting to a more natural state for it with these movements.

Wetlands can be some of the best sinks of carbon dioxide with a succession from fen to bog to swamp to increasingly dry peatlands over decades, centuries or millennia. This succession is natural and inexorable when human societies leave them to it. In our time communities are increasingly looking for ways to re-establish wetlands in the quest to sequester carbon as part of their response to climate change.

We are suggesting that Wellington could take stock of such hidden wetlands and look to see how resilience might be strengthened and carbon sequestered. Woodward St through The Terrace close to St Andrews is a good example; there is even a plaque and recorded sounds to help us reminisce of when it was an open stream. Then there is the Hutt River and the A Rocha Waiu Wetland project which Sonia Groes-Petrie of our group has contact with.

A new reference is a book (2022) by famous author Annie Proulx entitled "Fen, Bog, & Swamp", subtitled A Short History of Peatland Destruction and Its Role in the Climate Crisis (4th Estate, 196pp).

CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE URGENT TURKEY AND SYRIA EARTHQUAKE APPEAL

Turkey and Syria were struck by a major earthquake in the early hours of February 6, 2023 local time. Thousands of buildings have collapsed. Snow has fallen. Many people have lost their lives and been injured in the devastating quakes. Rescuers and local people are working hard to free people buried in the rubble. The initial 7.8 magnitude earthquake has been followed by severe aftershocks in the southeast of Turkey and northwest Syria. People are urgently in need of food, shelter and medical assistance.

Life was already hard. Many people had escaped conflicts and were extremely vulnerable. More than 4 million people were dependent on relief aid before the quakes. About three-quarters of the people living in Syria's Idlib province had fled fighting in other parts of the country. The people need protection from the bitterly cold winter and cholera. In liaison with the National Executive all Parishes to be notified that their support for our continuing mission in Aotearoa are welcome but the current model of the organisation is unsustainable. The Special Consultative Status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council will lapse.

At the September 2022 AGM, it was agreed that the original motion outlined above be left lying on the table and that a Special General Meeting be held in February 2023 to discuss that PWANZ be closed down.
