I drink deeply at these fountains now
with gratitude,
without guilt...

Two : I can jealously preserve
my freedom and autonomy :

I must learn to hold on
to those fountains that I drink from,
and not get stuck ;
to enjoy and not possess ;
seek nourishment and not sink roots.
For I must always be in readiness
to move when the time for rebirth comes.

And here I squarely face my fear
for it is fear that kills my freedom
and makes me cling.
I cling to human company
for I fear to be alone...
I cling to popularity
and I fear to give offence...
I cling to friends and family
for I fear to be rejected...
to authority, for I fear being on my own...
to the security of traditional beliefs
and dread to have them challenged...

Finally I cling to the known,
the familiar and the old
for I fear to be reborn
— to move into a world
that is new, unknown and unfamiliar.

I think how I shall drink of love today...
and joy...
and peace...
and pleasure...

And I think how I shall seek autonomy and freedom :
the risks I shall dare to take...
the discomforts I shall welcome...
the changes I shall be open to...
as a distant preparation
for the day I shall be born
into another, wider World.

RENT-A-BACH AND FUNDRAISING TO DATE

During the last few months three holiday homes have been available to St Andrew's people for rent as a fundraiser to help overcome the deficit in St Andrew's finances caused by Covid. The owners of the holiday homes listed below have generously donated all rent received to St Andrew's.

As at the end of January 2023 the amount raised through this initiative was \$4,560. More income from February will follow and there are some forward bookings for March and April.

This means that together with cake and jam sales of \$1,433 almost \$6,000 has been raised to date. Thank you to everyone who has contributed.

Following our February Finance and Facilities meeting we should be able to report how much has been raised through this initiative to date.

How about a late Summer break away from Wellington?

The three holiday homes available are:

1. A classic cottage in Greytown at \$90 per night;
2. A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night;
3. A holiday home at Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

The Cottage in Greytown sleeps up to 4 people (2 bedrooms: one queen, two singles). A separate sleep-out has 2 single beds for a larger group.

The house in Whanganui and the house near Picton both sleep up to 6 people. You need to provide your own towels and sheets.

For the houses in Greytown and Whanganui, you are responsible to leave the property as you found it. For the holiday home at Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

Send me an email to see if the property you would like to rent is available. Weekends tend to be at a premium so book early.

If your requested dates are available, you will be sent confirmation and detailed information about the holiday home and how to reach it, how to get in,

instructions about water and power, and you will be sent bank account details for you to pay for your stay.

CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE URGENT TURKEY & SYRIA EARTHQUAKE APPEAL

Turkey and Syria were struck by a major earthquake in the early hours of February 6, 2023 local time. Thousands of buildings have collapsed. Snow has fallen. Many people have lost their lives and been injured in the devastating quakes. Rescuers and local people are working hard to free people buried in the rubble. The initial 7.8 magnitude earthquake has been followed by severe aftershocks in the southeast of Turkey and northwest Syria. People are urgently in need of food, shelter and medical assistance.

Life was already hard. Many people had escaped conflicts and were extremely vulnerable. More than 4 million people were dependent on relief aid before the quakes. About three-quarters of the people living in Syria’s Idlib province had fled fighting in other parts of the country. The people need protection from the bitterly cold winter and cholera.
