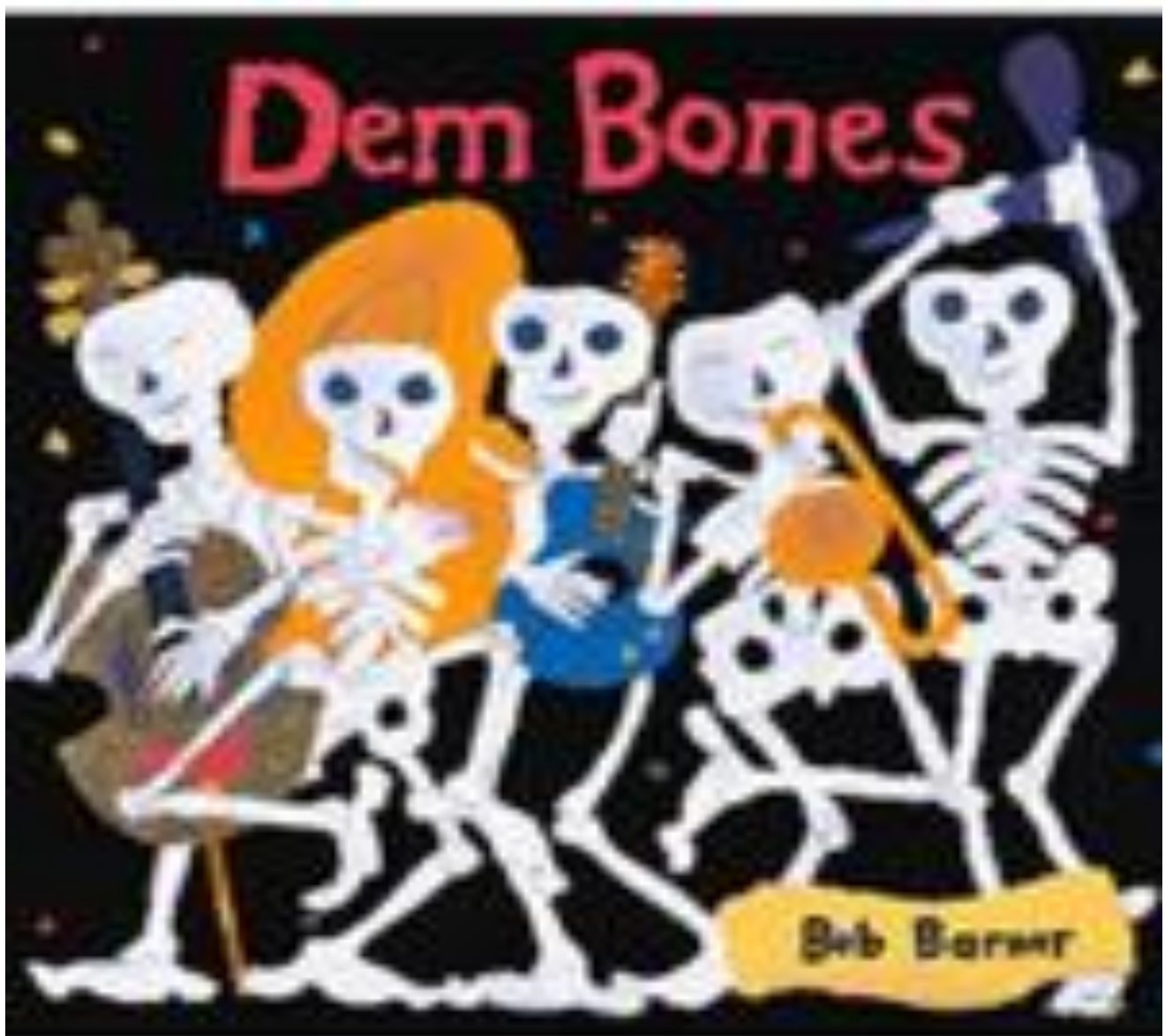

EXPLORING FAITH GROUP

The Exploring Faith group meets after morning tea on the first Sunday of the month and all are welcome. Pat Booth has taken on the task of coordinating this programme for the year.

The first series of meetings will focus on our commitment at St Andrew's to being a Progressive Church. What does that mean in terms of exploring faith? St Andrew's on The Terrace is known as being a Progressive Presbyterian Church in terms of Theology and Social Justice, and we acknowledge the 'eight points of Progressive Christianity' as one of our statements of faith. However, while we generally share a common understanding of social justice, our individual interpretations of the theological or faith component of being a progressive church are understandably very different, and rightly so.

Each month, two speakers will make a ten to fifteen minute presentation about why they chose to be part of this faith community, then there will be about half an hour for responses and discussion.

The first two speakers are Heather Macfarlane, a Presbyterian through and through, and the second, Pat Booth, of Baptist heritage, who has been part of St Andrew's for only about ten years. (Incidentally, we're both parson's kids.)

FUNDRAISER FOR OHOPE MARAE



I would like to propose that St Andrew's organise a fundraiser to contribute to the appeal for Ohope marae:

This work is taking place to safeguard the treasure that is Ohope Marae. There is some urgency here. Recent storms, flooding and

land slips in the North Island have reaffirmed the need for this work to be carried out as soon as possible. In December, Te Aka Puaho advised Council of Assembly of the need to undertake earthworks to retain a slope to the side of Te Maungarongo at the marae. In the image above, you can see that this work is underway. Thanks to your generosity, our appeal has already raised \$20,000 of the estimated \$110,000 required. We still have a long way to go. I encourage you to please raise the idea of giving to this appeal with your parish.

Together let's ensure this peaceful sanctuary remains open to all, available to all, and a place of significance for us and generations to come.

RENT-A-BACH AND FUNDRAISING UPDATE

Over the summer months three holiday homes have been available to St Andrew's people for rent as a fundraiser to help overcome last year's COVID-caused deficit. The owner of three holiday homes have generously donated all rent received to St Andrew's.

As at the end of February 2023 the amount raised through this initiative was \$5,060.00 Together with cake and jam sales the total fundraising effort has reached \$6,493.00. Thanks to all who have contributed to this effort.

If you would still like to take advantage of this opportunity, the houses in Whanganui and Whatamango Bay are still available. The Greytown cottage is no longer available.

Details are:

1. A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night.

2. A holiday home in Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

Both sleep up to six people. You need to provide your own sheets and towels. For the house in Whanganui you need to leave the property as you found it. For Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

RAINBOW COMMUNITY

The rainbow community needs allies to speak up and stand with us. You may have heard the news about opposition to Kellie-Jay Keen, AKA Posie Parker coming to speak here. She is currently on an international speaking tour focused on the supposed “danger” posed to women by trans people. Keen has used publicity around this tour to publicly oppose access to abortion and contraceptives for minors, and has been appearing in her Australian speaking events with anti-abortion campaigner & prominent Islamophobe Kirralie Smith. At her Melbourne rally nazi supporters gave the nazi salute and chanted “white power.” Her tour is funded by Conservative Political Action Conference, a US coalition that was significant in the campaign for annulment of Roe v. Wade. Keen is also notable among conservative anti-trans circles in the UK for her extreme racism and willingness to foster links with far-right, white supremacist and fascist groups and individuals. We believe her being allowed to come will increase the risk for our community, and we have concerns about the repercussions in terms of galvanising the far-right in this country. There is a counter rally on Sunday (today if you’re reading this in the OOS!). We have been asked to bring the Faith Communities United in Love banner. CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE TÜRKIYE SYRIA EARTHQUAKE ONE MONTH ON

CWS is grateful to our donors for supporting people affected by the magnitude 7.8 earthquake on February 6 local time. Local partners immediately opened churches and other buildings to people who had lost their homes. In northern Syria, the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate of Antioch and the Near East (GOPA-DERD) continues to provide food, health kits, medical services and psychosocial care to families

One month on the extent of the damage is becoming clearer. The political situation has made the humanitarian response challenging especially given aid in the region was already below what was needed. The freezing winter temperatures have also added to the suffering.

According to UNICEF the health situation in Syria was already overstretched because of the 12-year conflict, Covid and an outbreak of cholera. The situation is dire as many people struggle to find water, food, shelter and emergency medical and psychosocial support. Almost three million people have been

displaced in Türkiye and 8.8 million affected in Syria where many had sought safety from the conflict in much of the country.

ACT Alliance members were already working with Syrians and Palestinians when the first earthquake struck and are also working in Türkiye, host to 3.6 million Syrians and Palestinians, the largest refugee population in the world. The Arab Protestant Church in Aleppo is sheltering around 1,200 people in its schools and buildings, providing them with bedding, meals, hygiene items and basic medical care including psychosocial support with support from ACT Alliance. The next stage is to provide cash assistance and repair bakeries and other infrastructure. Bread is in short supply and the prices have risen because of the shortage and spike in wheat prices.
