Your spirit created humanity in your likeness. Your spirit sounded in the sage's story and the psalmist's psalm, renewing the hearts of your people.

***We give thanks to the holy source of life.***

In your time Beckoning God, you sent Jesus the Christ to be one with us. To call us back to you. He rejoiced with those who rejoiced and wept with those who wept. To the despairing, he spoke a word of hope; to the sick, he gave healing; to the rejected, he was a friend. Yet, he, too, faced difficult decisions and destructive forces. Betrayed. Deserted. Crucified. Through it all, he showed strength through his non-violence, wisdom in his speaking, depth of meaning in his silence. And so, with Elizabeth who prophesied your birth, Martha who confessed you as the Christ, and James and John who sought to follow in your way, we praise you saying:

### **RENT-A-BACH AND FUNDRAISING UPDATE**

Over the summer months three holiday homes have been available to St Andrew's people for rent as a fundraiser to help overcome last year's COVID-caused deficit. The owner of three holiday homes have generously donated all rent received to St Andrew's.

As at the end of February 2023 the amount raised through this initiative was \$5,060.00 Together with cake and jam sales the total fundraising effort has reached \$6,493.00. Thanks to all who have contributed to this effort.

If you would still like to take advantage of this opportunity, the houses in Whanganui and Whatamango Bay are still available. The Greytown cottage is no longer available.

Details are:

1. A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night.
2. A holiday home in Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

Both sleep up to six people. You need to provide your own sheets and towels. For the house in Whanganui you need to leave the property as you found it. For Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.
