Contemporary Reading

The word epiphany etymologically comes from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning "manifestation." It has come to refer to the feast celebrating the visit of the "wise men from the East" to the Christ Child, recounted in Matthew's Gospel.

And yet, what a mystery that the epiphany of God — God's manifestation — is hidden behind the tiny fingers and toes of an infant, whose cries cause his mother's milk to let down, just like any other infant in the world. From the beginnings of Christianity, saints and scholars have considered the richness of this mystery.

Here are three such reflections from some of the Church's great saints:

- 1. What are you doing, O Magi? Do you adore a little Babe, in a wretched hovel, wrapped in miserable rags? Can this Child be truly God? ... Are you become foolish, O Wise Men ... Yes, these Wise Men have become fools that they may be wise.
 - Saint Bernard of Clairvaux
- 2. Today the Magi gaze in deep wonder at what they see: heaven on earth, earth in heaven, man in God, God in man, one whom the whole universe cannot contain, now enclosed in a tiny body.

As they look, they believe and do not question, as their symbolic gifts bear witness: incense for God, gold for a king, myrrh for one who is to die.

Funds raised will meet some of the urgent needs of people through our long term partner the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees (DSPR). In Gaza, DSPR is providing shelter, food and support to people who have fled the north and who have lost homes. DSPR is an integral part of the local community. - medications and medical treatment
- psychosocial support
