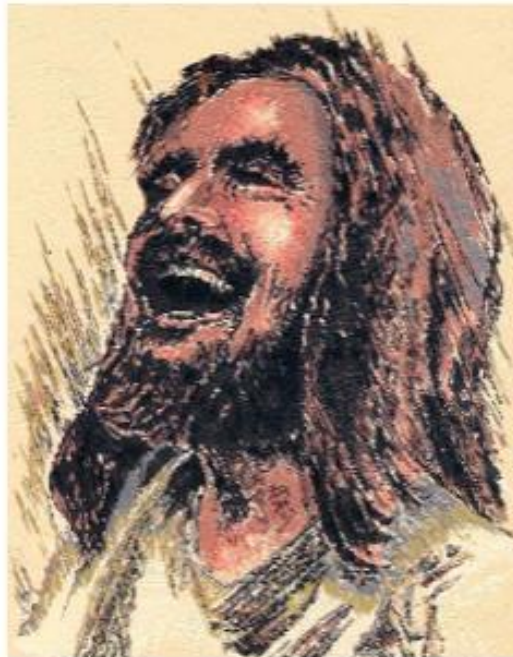

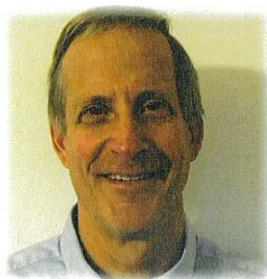

Featuring **Hans Hielscher**, an international organist from Germany, playing the newly restored Croft Pipe Organ.

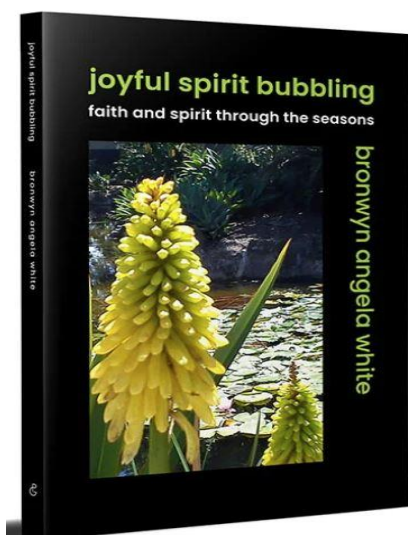
