Paraphrase of Gospel text

And he went into a home, and the crowd gathered together again. This time so many that they were not able even to eat bread. When the ones alongside him heard what was being said about him they went out to stand with him, for even the scribes who came down from Jerusalem were saying, "He has Beelzebul" and that, by the leader of demons, he casts out demons.

He responded to the claim by speaking to them in parables, "How is Satan able to cast out Satan?" and "If a kingdom be divided against itself, that kingdom is not able to stand" and "if a house be divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand" and "if Satan rose up against himself and be divided, he cannot stand, but has an end."

"But no one is able to enter into the house of the strong one, to plunder his vessels, except first the strong one be bound and then he will plunder his house."

"Truly I say to you that all will be forgiven the children of humanity, the sins and slanders, however much they may slander, but whoever might slander into the Holy Spirit does not have forgiveness into the eternal, but is subject to an eternal sin, for they were saying, "He has an unclean spirit."

And then his mother and his brothers came outside, trying to get through the crowd to him and the crowd sitting around him, said to him, "Behold, your mother and your brothers are outside seeking you." VUW UNIVERSITY COUNCIL ACTION FOR A LIVING WAGE

The fight for a living wage at Victoria University of Wellington (VUW) has now lasted over 10 years, and we still have not achieved wage justice at Wellington's second-largest employer. Currently, over 500 directly employed staff, as well as contracted cleaners and catering workers, receive less than the living wage. This is made even worse by VUW not following through with a promise made by Mark Loveard, the former COO of VUW, to the community that cleaners would be paid a living wage.

This time, we are taking our campaign directly to the 12 University Council members and the Vice Chancellor at their June meeting. Join us at 8:45 AM on the 17th of June at the Hunter Council Chamber, off Kelburn Parade.


