WIDER CHURCH AND COMMUNITY NOTICES

GIVE CLIMATE HOPE THIS CHRISTMAS

If you are keen to cut the climate impact of your Christmas, there's more you can do than limit consumption and avoid plastic this year. In 2024, the Christian World Service Christmas Appeal is calling for support to help Pacific Island Christians build climate resilience for families whose livelihoods and food security are threatened by climate change. Your donation to the 2024 CWS Christmas Appeal will help a Tongan food security organisation to replant village gardens up and out of harm's way for families whose traditional food growing plots are threatened by rising seas. Christian World Service also supports communities suffering from climate crisis impacts around the world through its Gifted catalogue, which allows climate-aware donors in Aotearoa to buy development and aid gifts for family members, such as a \$70 Rainwater tank for a community in sub-Saharan Africa, a \$100 Climate Hope grant for Pacific Christian climate activists, a \$45 Fruit tree for the Philippines or \$45 Bees for Sri Lanka. Make your Christmas spending work for the planet this year! Support Christian World Service and its climate resilience partners.

CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE GAZA PALESTINE EMERGENCY APPEAL

Christian World Service has launched an <u>emergency appeal</u> to assist people who have been affected by the current conflict in the Middle East, particularly Gaza. Nearly 85% of the population – 1.9 million people have been displaced in Gaza. They are in urgent need of food, water, shelter and safety. "The people of Gaza are living in harrowing conditions with limited resources, and we cannot stand idly by while they suffer... Our collective efforts can make a significant difference in the lives of those trapped in this nightmarish situation," DSPR. **Donations can be made through CWS.**
